VI GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Malawi Olympic Committee (MOC) proudly hosted the Elective General Assembly of the Association of National Olympic Committees of Africa (ANOCA) – Zone VI on February 22, 2025, at Sunbird Livingstonia in Salima.

The high-level event brought together 35 delegates from 10 African countries, including Eswatini, Angola, Botswana, Lesotho. Mozambique, Namibia, Zambia, Zimbabwe, South Africa, and Malawi. It was graced by Isaac Katopola, Principle Secretary in the Ministry of Youth and Sports, as Guest of Honour.

Speaking during the event, Local Organising Committee Chairperson Dennis Kumwenda highlighted the significance of the assembly, noting its role in boosting sports tourism, generating foreign exchange, and enhancing Malawi's visibility on the continental stage.

MALAWI CGA SETS STRATEGIC PATH FOR GLASGOW 2026 COMMONWEALTH GAMES



The Malawi Commonwealth Games Association (MAW CGA) is intensifying preparations for the Glasgow 2026 Commonwealth Games, set for 23 July–2 August 2026 in Scotland.

At a recent strategic meeting, officials from eight disciplines—including Netball, Athletics, Judo, Boxing, Aquatics, Para-Athletics, and Cycling—discussed training plans and athlete selection strategies.

"We're leaving no stone unturned. These are medal-potential disciplines," said Francis Kakhuta Banda, Chef de Mission.

Netball Association's Cecelia Mtukule emphasized youth development through training camps and talent identification programs.

Malawi aims to end a 40-year medal drought, last reaching the podium in Boxing at the 1986 Commonwealth Games.



MOC URGES GREATER INVESTMENT IN SPORT PERFORMANCE

Malawi Olympic Committee (MOC) President Jappie Mhango has called for urgent investment in athlete development and infrastructure following Team Malawi's poor performance at recent major games.

Speaking at the MOC Annual General Meeting held at Mount Soche Hotel in Blantyre, Mhango noted that while governance has improved, podium results remain elusive.

"Our performance at the African and Olympic Games was disappointing. We need more investment in infrastructure, coaches, and athlete development if we are to be competitive," he said.

He urged government and stakeholders to step up support, emphasizing that sport is a major industry worth prioritizing.

MOC Secretary General Henry Sakala outlined ongoing development projects, while Director of Sports Jameson Ndalama and Malawi National Council of Sports' Shephord Boma pledged continued support and collaboration.



MALAWI CELEBRATES COMMONWEALTH DAY

Malawi joined fellow member nations in celebrating Commonwealth Day on 10th March 2025 with a vibrant event themed "Together We Thrive." The day began with a fun walk from Game Complex to Civo Stadium in Lilongwe, followed by speeches, games, and entertainment.

British High Commissioner Fiona Ritchie highlighted the significance of youth in this year's celebrations, saying:

"Young people are key to Malawi's future and the Commonwealth's prosperity. This event is all about connection and building a better future together."
